I posted a message in the Mil-Veh email list and got a bunch of tips, but the best one came from a lister who mentioned Tear-Mender by VAL-A. It is an adhesive made for cloths. I called around and found out that TrueValue in Cary has it, \$5.95 for a 6oz. bottle. I had to wait until the canvas

was dry before applying it (with the rain we had lately that wasn't easy:-). I used a piece of a military canvas belt (the real thick stuff) to patch the tear. Let me tell you, I couldn't take it off if I try now. The stuff is something else, it comes off ones fingers just by rubbing together. I did it from the inside as directed, and you can hardly tell from the outside that it was repaired. So if you have a tear/hole in canvas, use it.

The kids seem to like loud stuff. After the parade we went to the air field for the week end. Met lots of people and learned a few thing. Met several people here from the military vehicles email list and several from the NCMVPA. For the next show I will bring a sidekick and a chair. I got tired of standing and not having someone to hang out with.

Next: Not all people will treat your stuff like it was theirs. Actually they will treat it like it's theirs, not yours. I was amazed at the number of children, with parents in tow, that would climb into my truck and start pulling and twisting everything they could get their hands on. Cel ebrate Freedom

The Celebrate Freedom Festival was held in Columbia, South Carolina on November 8, 9, and 10. I arrived just prior to the gates opening at 1pm and already people were lining up to go in.

There was lots of activity as vintage aircraft circled overhead prior to landing at the airstrip, and military vehicles of all descriptions were running about. After being checked out by the large security force and paying a \$5 "donation" for admission I entered the facility and was really impressed. There were approximately 50 to 75 military vehicles, everything from Cushman motor scooters and paratrooper bicycles all the way up to an Abrams main battle tank courtesy of the USMC. My friend Tommy Hammill had his British Fox armoured car on display, which has just been restored and looked very nice in it's desert tan camo paint.

The aircraft were a big hit as well, with something for everyone, including B-17 and B-24 bombers from the Collings Foundation which were open for touring, as well as numerous fighter aircraft, a Navy PBY flying boat, even an authentic Berlin Airlift transport aircraft. There were lots of rotor craft on display as well, with the majority of them being Vietnam-era Huey's.

All the vehicles I saw, whether aircraft or military vehicles, were all nicely restored and maintained and it was a real pleasure to see them. Also worthy of mention were the living history re-enactors who were set up at the far end of the airfield. There was a really impressive setup of US Army medical tents, including lots of re-enactors as "wounded." One thing that impressed me was a solitary Russian, who had an encampment set up as it would have

been during WW2. It was very educational to see all his equipment laid out, and he delighted in telling people all sorts of Russian Army facts. Did you know that the

Russian Army did not issue their soldiers socks???? On the other hand, you should have seen the thick woolen boot inserts that were issued! Maybe that is why the Russians defeated the invading German Army during the war? I don't think the Germans had as good cold-weather equipment!

Overall, I think the show was very good, and I certainly plan on attending again next year, as well as joining the Celebrate Freedom Foundation. They have a website and the address is
