2003 East Coast Convoy and the Churchville Rally

It was a cold and dark Golden Coral parking lot in Cary at 3:00AM on May 8th when Kenny Grantham and I motored over in my M37 to join Brandon Cobb in his M35 for the ride up to Churchville via Doswll, VA. In Doswell, we were met by a friend of the convoy organizer who had baked cookies and other goodies for us, and we joined up with several other military vehicle owners from Virginia, North Carolina, and South Carolina (such as Joe Trapp and Tony Casey) for the ride up toward Maryland. In Millersville, MD, we again stopped and met a group from West Virginia, Maryland, and northern Virginia and rode up through Baltimore toward Aberdeen (went through the harbor tunnel). In Churchville, we lined up in a long single file line in a Golden Coral parking lot and waited for the folks who were convoying down from north of the rally site (some from as far away as Canada). We all got a charge out of seeing the other guys come down the hill to the parking lot in a big ol' column, and we all did a lot of horn honking and waving, before we all settled down and headed out for the short ride to the rally site.

At the rally, we had three days of rain, some sun, a lot of mud, and great bull sessions, parts purchases and trades, and a lot of fellowship. It was great to be able to put faces to names of folks that I had only known from email or phone conversations.

On Saturday, our group from the Carolinas, joined by some of the folks from Maryland and Virginia, pulled out of the rally area since we had already made our purchases, sold most of our spare parts, and wanted to get home before the weather got really nasty (forecast was calling for more severe thunderstorms...). We drove back down toward home with folks turning off along the way to go to their respective homes with much honking and hand waving at each parting. Along the way, we drove through extremely hard rain and hail at times so

heavy that we could hardly see the front bumpers, but the water washed most of the weekend's mud of of the trucks and our shoes (my cab still leaks a bit...).

All of the members of the convoy from the south (the Yellow Serial) made it up and back safely with only a dead electric fan in my M37 (bad socket in the fuse block) and a gear lube leak in Joe Trapp's M35 transfer case (lost it's gear oil a few miles from home on the return trip but made it back under its own power) to detract from the trip.

Roof for your MV

If your MV is not under a roof (and you can't afford a couple of thousands to build one) purchase one of them portable canopies (around \$100) and park the vehicle under it. My M1009 is under one of these and a strong wind moved the canopy, so I am now strapping the four corners of the canopy to four corners of the vehicle to keep it on the ground. Last year I bought a 20X20 canopy and parked my pickup under it, but it couldn't hold the weight of the ice from the storm we had, and the legs buckled. I put eight 4x4 posts in the ground and mounted the top of the canopy to them, eliminating the weak legs, and since then I put four more posts and added another 20x20 next to the existing one. Since the 4x4 can be cut at any height, I made it so that I could pull the M35 under it. Only problem it is not long enough, so the tail end of the bed sticks out, but it is covered with canvas anyway. Now the cab, gun ring and gun are protected. We will see how this holds. I had estimates of \$3600.00 to build a wooden shelter with shingle roof for the truck only and I was worried that a hurricane will blow it off, so I figured I could always take the tarp off in the case of a hurricane coming, and even if I didn't, I will only loose a couple of hundreds. A replacement tarp for the 20x20 is only \$54.00 and replacing it every few years is not too bad. The 10x20 tarp replacement is only \$19.95. With the amount of rain we had this year, these are handy. You can check Harbor Freight for pricing on these and buy them on sale.
