EAST COAST CONVOY/RALLY

I had a great trip to Aberdeen...

I left my house at three on Wednesday in the M35A2C and drove over to Amnon's house only to find that he hadn't managed to fix his transmission problem in Blazer and would not be joining me for the ride up. I suggested that he leave his truck and ride up in mine, but he wanted to keep working on his in the hopes that he could drive up on Thursday... I did borrow a turn signal controller off his M35A2 since mine decided to stop working between my house and is we agreed that I could get him a new one at the show...

I then drove up to Henderson where I waited about a half-hour for the group driving up from Florida, South Carolina, and Western North Carolina to arrive. After they had arrived and refueled, we all left and headed up to South Hill in order to meet up with Bjorn who was heading in from Western Virginia. He had called to tell me that he was running late, and we were running late, so when we didn't spot him at the rendezvous, we went on to Doswell where we met him later on that evening (he and his son got there just in time to have supper with us at the Denny's in the Best Western next to Kings Dominion.).

Next morning, we all got up and headed over to the truck stop across the street from the hotel in order to fuel and to meet Blake who had just driven up from Portsmouth in his deuce with a MUTT in the back. We all then headed up US301 through Fort AP Hill toward Millersville, MD. In Millersville, we collected three other guys, one in a M35 like the rest of us, one in a M37, and one in a M38A1... The addition of the M37 and

M38A1 kept the Southern Serial from consisting entirely of deuces as everyone to that point had been driving a M35... All of us then rode up through Baltimore to Aberdeen where we met the Blue Serial of about twenty that had driven down from as far north as Canada.

After collecting our convoy shirts and other goodies, we all got together in a big line with the smallest trucks first working up to the larger trucks in the rear, we drove the last three miles over to the Military Vehicle rally at the Ripken Baseball Stadium just down the street from the Army's Proving Grounds.

We had a great time parading through the display area and up to the hill where we all camped out for the weekend.

The weekend was spent socializing, looking at other folk's vehicles, and trading parts.

On Sunday morning, those of us from the south who had not left on Saturday pulled out for the ride home. When we stopped at the rest area just north of Richmond we noticed that the generator extension on Sonny's trailer had come loose, so the generator was removed and placed in the back of his truck with the assistance of Bjorn's knuckleboom. We then decided to have lunch at the same Denny's that we had eaten at on Wednesday...

I parted company with Bjorn and Sonny after lunch, they to continue on down I95 to visit John Winslow (Bjorn to collect the tires that he won in the convoy raffle and Sonny for some assistance with an oil leak and his continued trip towards Florida) and I to head down I85 toward Raleigh.

WOOD TIPS

The following is a reprint from the BigElectric M37 forum where a discussion was held on how to stain wood for cargo bows and seats that seemed applicable to any MV with wooden troop seats or cargo bows...

The wood in the bed of our M37 was oak. We couldn't bring ourselves to paint oak, it has too nice a grain and it's expensive compared to pine.

I've rebuilt a couple of wooden boats and followed the finishing technique that we used on the boats.

- 1. Sand down to a 240 grit finish
- 2. Put about four coats or more of West epoxy on them.
- 3. Sand after the final coat of epoxy cures. You'll take a lot of the epoxy off in the sanding process to get it smooth.
- 4. Get some Interlux 2-part marine polyurethane. Put about three coats on. It flows pretty well and is similar to DuPont Imron. It has good abrasion characteristics and good UV protection characteristics. You can use this for everything if you don't want to go the epoxy route. It can be purchased from BoatUS or U.S. Marine. Any marine store will have it. It runs about \$45 a quart and a quart is all you will need. Bear in mind to only mix up what you are going to use.

When you are done, the wood will really be protected and will be pretty abrasion, UV and chip resistant. It looks pretty good with the clear finish on the oak wood.

After driving home with my son from Weare [NH] for 4+ hrs without being able to hear one another, We decided it was time for a cheap intercom for the M35A2. Another GMMVC'er has a set of aviation headsets + the com unit, beautiful but beyond my budget. Mr. Waterman at MVMVC described using an old CB in PA mode, which works well but I think I found an even simpler alternative. I use two noise canceling headsets that I purchased at Radioshack (\$20 each includes ear bud and throat mike), a "mini-amplifier" (\$10 each), four batteries, and two y-connectors. The two mike plugs go into one Y that is plugged into the amp input. The amp output goes into a y and out to the two earbud plugs. Total expense was about \$60.

Not elegant but it gets the job done! I was going to build my own IC, but this is quick and it works. Bash away!!

FIRST SATURDAYS IN RALEIGH/CARY

downtown Raleigh at noon and will then

Directions to the Golden Coral in Cary:

The restaurant is located in the "Centrum" shopping center off of Walnut street and I-40/440/1/64. If you are coming into the area on I-40, take exit 493 to Walnut St./Buck Jones Road. At the next light turn left (over the beltline) into Walnut St., go through 2 more lights, and turn right at the third light which is Dillard Dr. The backside of The Golden Coral will be on your left, at the bottom of the hill turn left into the shopping center, and immediately take another left into their parking lot.

If you are coming on 440/US-1/US-64 going south, take the Buck Jones Road exit 1a (do not confuse it with the Jones Franklin Rd. exit) and follow the directions above. If you are going north, turn RIGHT at the Buck Jones Road light.

Directions to the Vietnam Memorial:

From I40 on south side or Raleigh, take the Wilmington Street exit and head toward downtown Raleigh. The Memorial is located on the Capital Square on your left. From I440 on north side of Raleigh, take the Capital Blvd. exit and head toward downtown Raleigh turn left on Hillsboro Street. At the Capital Square (end of Hillsborough Street), turn right, then left, then left again (going around the Capital

Square) to the memorial that is located on the opposite side of the Capital building from Hillsboro Street
